## A Message from the Director

On behalf of the Children's Trust Fund (CTF) Board of Directors, we are pleased to present the CTF Annual Report for State Fiscal Year 2010.

Reducing child abuse and neglect, keeping children safe and making Missouri families stronger remains the top priorities of CTF. Despite the sluggish economy and declining revenues, this effort continued in full force throughout the year. CTF obligated over \$2.5 million for prevention initiatives, which provided financial support to 110 community prevention organizations and state prevention partners directly impacting over 71,000 children and their families.

In addition, thousands of others benefited indirectly as a result of these critical prevention services and through receiving parenting and other prevention education materials provided by CTF at no cost.

Donors and supporters can be assured that for every dollar contributed to CTF, 87 cents goes directly back into serving Missouri's children and families through prevention programming and CTF public education campaigns. These include programs that prevent child abuse and neglect by providing parent education; home visitation to new or young parents and to those who have a medically fragile child; safe crib and safe sleep information; parent support for fathers, grandparents and incarcerated parents; and support for crisis nurseries to name a few. Your donations allow CTF to develop and disseminate public education and awareness campaigns that encourage Shaken Baby Syndrome (SBS) prevention, positive and patient parenting, emotional abuse prevention, and reminders to never leave children unattended in or around a vehicle...Not Even For a Minute.

Prevention is the key to keeping our children safe and creating strong resilient families. Prevention is the insurance for good health, mental health, and educational and economic prosperity for our next generation. Thank you for your ongoing investment in Missouri's kids through the Children's Trust Fund.

## **History**

The Children's Trust Fund (CTF) was created by the Missouri General Assembly in 1983 as a fund dedicated solely to support child abuse and neglect prevention programs throughout the state. CTF is authorized to enter into contracts with public or private agencies, schools or qualified individuals to establish community-based educational and service programs focused on preventing child abuse and neglect. CTF is also directed to facilitate information exchange between stakeholders interested with child abuse prevention and to provide statewide public education regarding issues facing families and children.

CTF is not appropriated state general revenue funds for child abuse prevention. Funding is obtained from dedicated fees on marriage licenses and vital records, sales of the CTF specialty license plate, voluntary contributions designated on Missouri State Income Tax Returns, other voluntary contributions, and interest income from the Fund. CTF also administers the Community Based Child Abuse Prevention (CBCAP) Federal Grant.

## **Statewide Projects / Initiatives**

#### 2010 'Eat Smart Play Hard' Calendar

CTF distributed 9,000 Eat Smart Play Hard 2010 calendars produced in cooperation with the Missouri Association of Community Action (MACA). The calendar features parenting tips, nutrition information, healthy recipes and menu suggestions, and tips for feeding young children. It is distributed to families enrolled in Head Start and other child care programs, county family service and health department offices, WIC programs, food banks, community action outreach offices, and CTF prevention programs.

#### Kid's Count 2009 Data Book

First produced in 1993, the Kids Count in Missouri Data Book is the state's most comprehensive compilation and analysis of data on child well-being, documenting the status of children in all 114 Missouri counties and the City of St. Louis. The project's mission is to improve the well-being of Missouri's children by heightening awareness of children's issues within local communities and promoting more effective responses to children's needs throughout the state. The Kid's Count Data Book is produced through a collaborative effort between the Citizens for Missouri's Children (CMC), the Annie E. Casey Foundation, Office of Social and Economic Data Analysis (OSEDA), CTF, and more than 30 public and private partner organizations. #### **Missouri Prevention Partners (MPP)**

The Missouri Prevention Partners (MPP), which CTF is a founding member, is a coalition of 20 state-wide public and private nonprofit organizations working together to prevent child abuse and neglect.



Organized in 2006, the coalition has developed an action plan incorporating the five protective factors to prevent child abuse and neglect and strengthen families through increased public awareness, promoting effective prevention programming, increased prevention funding and advocating for children.

#### **Show Me Bright Futures (SMBF)**

The Show Me Bright Futures (SMBF) State Strategic Planning Team's goals are to: 1.) create long-term public health infrastructure to support the social and emotional well-being of children and their families, and 2.) foster sustainable community teams that will implement a public health model and plan intentionally and strategically for the healthy social and emotional development of all children. The SMBF initiative is supported by a three-year grant from the Missouri Foundation for Health to develop the public health model for children's mental health needs in three communities. In addition to providing financial support, CTF collaborated with SMBF to involve the Community Based Child Abuse and Prevention (CBCAP) Initiatives in Joplin, Rolla and Moberly.

#### Missouri Strengthening Families Initiative (SFI)

In partnership with the Missouri Department of Social Services (DSS), Children's Division, CTF continues to work with the Strengthening Families Initiative in Missouri. CTF is also an active member of the Strengthening Families National Network, as well as the Early Learning Initiative facilitated by the National Alliance of Children's Trust and Prevention Funds. With support from the Doris Duke Charitable Foundation, the Center for the Study of Social Policy (CSSP) spent two years researching and identifying five protective factors that prevent child abuse and neglect. The research proved that excellent early care and education programs use common program strategies to build the protective factors known to reduce child abuse and neglect. These five protective factors include:

- enhancing parent resilience
- providing an array of social connections
- facilitating parent knowledge and skills regarding parenting and child development
- providing resources and referrals in times of stress
- supporting healthy social and emotional development in young children.

CTF has embedded the five protective factors that strengthen families into its grant application requiring applicants to specifically describe how these factors will be applied within their own prevention program. In addition, CTF provided funding to the University of Missouri, Center for Family Policy and Research to support the revision of the Kansas and Missouri Bi-State Core Competencies for Early Care and Education Professionals – 2nd Edition. The revisions include the integration of the five protective factors. For additional information on SFI visit the Center for the Study of Social Policy at www.cssp.org.

#### **Home Visitation Prevention Services**

With funding provided by the Missouri Department of Social Services (DSS), CTF partnered with Nurses For Newborns Foundation (NFNF) to provide essential home visitation prevention services in St. Louis City and County, Franklin, Greene, Jefferson, St. Charles, St. Francois and Washington counties. These services, provided by a registered nurse, target parents twenty-one years of age or younger and parents exceeding this age who are mentally and/or physically challenged or who are substance abusers. The project focused on promoting effective parenting skills, prevention of repeat teen preg-

nancies, increasing educational achievement, increasing self-support and self-esteem, promoting healthy birth outcomes, and ensuring the safety and overall well-being of children. In Fiscal Year 2010, NFNF provided 5,666 service hours through home visits to 1355 families (2781 individuals) as a result of this project. Outcomes reported include prevention of subsequent pregnancies among teen moms participating, increased immunizations of infants, reduction in the inappropriate use of emergency rooms, and 99% of participants free of a substantiated report of child abuse.

#### **State Technical Assistance Team (STAT)**

CTF awarded \$23,825 to the Missouri Department of Social Services (DSS), State Technical Assistance Team (STAT), who provided eight (8) regional trainings to 478 child protection professionals on the operations of the Child Fatality Review Program (CFRP). In addition, STAT provided four (4) regional trainings to 487 child protection professionals on understanding and interviewing child molesters. CTF also provided funds for the Missouri CFRP Annual Report Preventing Child Deaths in Missouri, as well as the development of six-part DVD-based training series for Children's Division staff.

#### **CTF Survey & Assessment**

In the fall of 2009, CTF contracted with Grants and Beyond, Concordia, MO to conduct an independent survey of partner organizations and other stakeholders. The survey identified strengths, needs, opportunities as well as challenges to be used by CTF Board and staff in planning future programming and public education. CTF was rated at the highest level "consistently exceeds expectations" in the areas of staff, technical support, communication, responsiveness; grant application process; and public education materials produced.

#### Missouri Business Leaders Summit

The Missouri Business Leaders Summit on Early Childhood Investment was held November 16, 2009 in St. Louis. CTF was pleased to provide financial support for the summit hosted by The PEW Center on the States Partnership for America's Economic Success, the National Center for Parents As Teachers, Missouri Chamber of Commerce and Industry and the Federal Reserve Bank of St. Louis. Other partners included the Missouri Child Care Resource and Referral Network and the Coordinating Board of Early Childhood. The primary message resounding throughout the event was the need to invest in America's Children through strong early education and prevention programming which is critical to our present and future economic success.

### **Public Education & Awareness**

#### **Activity Plan**

CTF provides awareness of various prevention messages through available literature and a comprehensive public education plan. CTF contracts with Learfield Communications, Inc. and Firehouse Design to develop an annual strategic plan for its advertising/media campaign. The related activity plan includes a media mix of print, radio, billboard, cable television, website refreshment, literature design, etc. Through the campaign, CTF promotes general awareness of CTF, the sale of its specialty license plate and the tax-checkoff program. CTF's prevention messages focus on the importance of prevention, Shaken Baby Syndrome (SBS) prevention, safe sleep environments, positive parenting, emotional child abuse and neglect, and the dangers of leaving children unattended in or around vehicles. At no charge to Missouri residents and organizations, CTF offers brochures, posters and SBS DVDs to its partners, State departments, hospitals and other child serving agencies throughout Missouri for training purposes and as general information to share with parents and caregivers.

#### **Podcasting**

CTF continued podcasting in Fiscal Year 2010 by producing and airing 4 podcasts. Topics included Community Based Child Abuse Prevention (CBCAP), the Strengthening Families Initiative (SFI), the Office of Child Advocate, and Protecting Our Children on the Internet. CTF podcasts are available on the CTF website and through electronic means such as ITunes.

#### **Website**

The CTF website, www.ctf4kids.org, provides a blog format to highlight CTF activities and information related to grant recipients, license plate partners, funding sources, the CTF specialty license plate, available CTF literature, public education, special events and other information regarding child abuse prevention. Through Collectors Solutions, Inc., the website also offers a secure site to accept online credit/debit card and e-checking donations.

#### **Electronic Positive Parenting Tips**

CTF partnered with Parents As Teachers (PAT) to create a series of parenting tips available via electronic formats on the CTF website. PAT professionals wrote and presented the topics by age groups, and Firehouse Design provided the creative: Positive Parenting; Developing a Strong Relationship with Your Child; Understanding Discipline & Guidance; Issues in Development; Observing & Knowing Your Child; Development-Language, Motor, Intellectual, Social-Emotional.

#### **Golf Tournament**

## Check-Off Child Abuse in Missouri

For Missourians who receive a refund on their Missouri State Income Tax Returns, the tax check-off campaign offers a way to designate all or a portion of their refund to CTF. This program was promoted in February and March 2010 using print ads and a radio campaign that aired on the Missourinet and in the metro areas of St. Louis, Columbia, Kansas City and Springfield. Governor Jay Nixon and First Lady Georganne Nixon taped a thirty-second radio ad that was produced by Learfield Communications, Inc. and included in the six-week radio rotation to promote the program throughout Missouri. CTF also provided an electronic flier to State employees, its Board and prevention partners to promote the campaign. CTF received \$89,050.32 in Fiscal Year 2010 related to this campaign.





## **Award Presentations**

#### **Easter Award**

Lieutenant Ryan Holder of the Pemiscot County Sheriff's Department received the 2010 Richard P. Easter Award for his exemplary contribution to child abuse and neglect prevention and child protection efforts. Sheriff Tommy Greenwell of the Department was the nominator, and the recommendation was supported by the State Technical Assistance Team (STAT). Lt. Holder received the award during a surprise ceremony before his family and peers in Caruthersville June 10 at the Sheriff's Department. The CTF Board of Directors established this award in honor of the late Richard P. Easter, who was long associated with the law enforcement and criminal justice fields and is remembered for his commitment and leadership in promoting statewide prevention efforts to better protect Missouri's children.

#### **Donovan Award**

Rep. Jeff Grisamore received the 2009 Laurie Donovan award December 7, 2009 during the Children's Services Commission meeting, which he is the Chair. This annual award recognizes elected officials who have provided leadership in the area of child abuse prevention, family support, and overall concern and advocacy for family issues.

#### **Chair Award**

Senator Carl Vogel, CTF Board member, was presented the 2009 CTF Chair Award for his outstanding and steadfast support of CTF. Senator Vogel, Jefferson City, has served on the CTF Board since 2003. The Chair Award is given by the Chair at their discretion to recognize a Board member, former Board member, other individual or organization for exemplary service and/or volunteer work on behalf of CTF.

## **Prevention Programming**

Fiscal Year 2010 (July 1, 2009 - June 30, 2010)

#### **General Prevention Grants**

The CTF Board of Directors approved and awarded \$915,036 for Fiscal Year 2010 to fifty-one (51) community-based organizations and agencies throughout Missouri to provide programs and services that help support families reduce the risk of child abuse and neglect. CTF funded specific child abuse and neglect models that included safe crib, infant nurturing, father support, grandparent support, home visitation, parent support and education, mentoring, respite care, research and training, etc.

To promote sustainability, CTF commits funding to successful grantees on a five-year cycle. CTF funds projects at 100% during years one and two; in year three, CTF funds 75%, and the grantee provides a 25% local match; in year four, CTF funds 50%, and the local match is 50%; and in year five, CTF funds 25%, and the local match is 75%.

#### **Discretionary Grants**


CTF allocates a certain portion of its annual program budget to fund discretionary projects or 'mini-grants.' Discretionary funding is designed to be responsive to low-cost prevention projects or needs identified by individual communities, organizations or agencies. A maximum of \$5,000 per grant award is available for these special prevention projects. During Fiscal Year 2010, CTF awarded \$57,837 in discretionary funding to twelve (12) grantees. As part of this amount, \$15,000 was provided to three (3) grantees to support crisis nursery services using funds made available through a previous donation by the Missouri Fraternal Order of Eagles (F.O.E.).

## **Community Based Child Abuse Prevention** (CBCAP) Grants

In FY 2010, CTF awarded \$310,799 to three (3) Missouri communities, Caruthersville, Joplin and Marshall, to continue the Community Based Child Abuse Prevention (CBCAP) grant project.

CBCAP funding is a federal initiative administered by the Administration of Children, Youth and Families (ACF), Department of Health and Human Services. CTF is the designated lead agency to administer this funding in Missouri. By incorporating a lead agency concept, the CBCAP communities provide a seamless coordination and delivery of prevention and family support services to families and children; reduce duplication of existing services; maximize resources of public and private providers; and ultimately reduce the risk of child abuse and neglect. During FY 2010, 160 high risk families consisting of over 605 individuals received services through this project.

The Missouri CBCAP model is recognized by ACF as attaining the highest level of program standards and performance indicated by evidenced based outcomes and successful replication of the program in other communities. CBCAP sites continue to show statistically significant improvement in scores of standardized measures of family risk (Child Abuse Potential Inventory) and distress (Parent Stress Index) among participating parents. Families also report high levels of satisfaction with the services they receive. An additional outcome includes communities successfully leveraging other funds, thereby increasing their capacity to better serve families.





#### **License Plate Marketing Partner Grants**

The CTF 'prevent child abuse' license plate is Missouri's number one selling specialty plate with approximately 9,000 active plates purchased as of June 2010. License plate marketing partner organizations throughout Missouri help promote and sell the plates to increase prevention awareness and raise funds that are returned directly back into the community for prevention programs. During Fiscal Year 2010, CTF distributed a total of \$187,518.79 to 39 community partner organizations with more than 41,083 children, parents and other caregivers directly benefitting.




