## A Message from the Director

On behalf of the CTF Board of Directors and staff, I am pleased to present the Children's Trust Fund (CTF) Annual Report for Fiscal Year 2012. The following pages highlight our ongoing mission to keep Missouri's children safe and strengthen their families by preventing child abuse and neglect. This is accomplished by partnering with community-based organizations throughout the state and through our own public education campaigns, training and literature, which is provided at no cost to thousands of parents, caretakers, students, educators, home visitors and other providers.

In Fiscal Year 2012, CTF provided over \$2.8 million in prevention programming, including awarding prevention grants to over 100 community organizations that work with children and families. Additionally, CTF revised and reissued our *Prevent Shaken Baby Prevention* DVD, adding a unit on *Safe Sleep for Your Baby*. CTF also developed a new flier addressing emotional well-being of children and preventing emotional abuse. Supporting these important prevention projects and initiatives are made possible only with continued support from our generous donors and other dedicated fees which we receive.

Unfortunately, the horrific cases of child abuse occurring this past year, both in our state and nationally, continues to be a stark reminder that keeping our children safe and preventing violent and abusive acts against them are truly everyone's responsibility!

Thank you for your ongoing investment in Missouri's kids through the Children's Trust Fund.

## History

The Children's Trust Fund (CTF) was created by the Missouri General Assembly in 1983 as a fund dedicated solely to support child abuse and neglect prevention programs throughout the state. CTF is authorized to enter into contracts with public or private agencies, schools or qualified individuals to establish communitybased educational and service programs focused on preventing child abuse and neglect. CTF is also directed to facilitate information exchange between stakeholders interested with child abuse prevention and to provide statewide public education regarding issues facing families and children.

CTF is not appropriated state general revenue funds for child abuse prevention. Funding is obtained from dedicated fees on marriage licenses and vital records, sales of the CTF specialty license plate, voluntary contributions designated on Missouri State Income Tax Returns, other voluntary contributions, and interest income from the Fund. CTF also administers the Community Based Child Abuse Prevention (CBCAP) Federal Grant.

## **Statewide Projects / Initiatives**

#### Kid's Count 2011 Data Book

First produced in 1993, the Kids Count in Missouri Data Book is the state's most comprehensive compilation and analysis of data on child well-being, documenting the status of children in all 114 Missouri counties and the City of St. Louis. The project's mission is to improve the well-being of Mis-



souri's children by heightening awareness of children's issues within local communities and promoting more effective responses to children's needs throughout the state. The Kid's Count Data Book is produced through a collaborative effort among the Partnership for Children, Office of Social and Economic Data Analysis (OSEDA), the Children's Trust Fund, the Annie E. Casey Foundation, and more than 20 public and private partner organizations serving in an advisory role. #### **Show Me Bright Futures**

Through the Show Me Bright Futures (SMBF) Initiative, Missouri is engaging communities to implement a public health approach to prevent mental illness and plan for the healthy physical, social and emotional development of all children. Convened and coordinated by the Missouri Department of Mental Health (DMH) through a grant from the Missouri Foundation for Health, the SMBF state planning team has been meeting since 2005 to disseminate and advance Bright Futures in Missouri. SMBF is now a standing committee within the Comprehensive Services Management Team (CMST), an interagency comprehensive children's mental health service system team that provides oversight to the System of Care (SOC) Initiative and provides support to community-based SOC teams. SOC teams consist of a partnership of family members, state child serving agencies, organizations and communities with shared responsibility to meet the mental health needs of children, youth and their families.

The SMBF state team is comprised of representatives from DMH, the Department of Health and Senior Services, the Department of Social Services, the Missouri School Boards Association, Head Start, University of Missouri and the Children's Trust Fund. CTF provided funding and collaborated with the SMBF team to implement the initiative into the three CTF Community Based Child Abuse and Prevention (CBCAP) communities in Joplin, Rolla and Moberly. Using the Public Health Model, each site has implemented children's mental health projects focusing on early care and education, stigma-reduction, and building social and emotional protective factors.

In Fiscal Year 2012, CTF also entered into an agreement with DMH to begin the process to educate existing SOC teams on the Public Health Model, and how it can be used to promote mental health wellness as a means of preventing child abuse and neglect.

#### Missouri Strengthening Families Initiative (SFI)

With support from the Doris Duke Charitable Foundation, the Center for the Study of Social Policy (CSSP) conducted research and identified five protective factors that prevent child abuse and neglect. Protective factors are conditions in families and communities that, when present, increase the health and well-being of children and families. They are attributes that serve as buffers, helping parents who might otherwise be at risk of abusing their children to find resources, supports or coping strategies that allow them to parent effectively, even under stress. The research proved that excellent early care, education and prevention programs use common program strategies to build the following protective factors known to reduce child abuse and neglect:

- enhancing parent resilience
- providing an array of social connections
- facilitating parent knowledge & skills regarding parenting & child development
- providing resources & referrals in times of stress
- supporting healthy social & emotional development in young children.
- nurturing & attachment \*added since the initial research

CTF continues to work with the Strengthening Families Framework (SFF) Initiative in Missouri by promoting the protective factors in a number of ways. Missouri is one of 30 states actively involved with the Strengthening Families National Network. CTF is also a member of the Early Learning Initiative facilitated by the National Alliance of Children's Trust and Prevention Funds. CTF has embedded the protective factors into its grant application process and its statewide public awareness campaigns. All CTF partners are required to promote the protective factors through their work with Missouri families. In addition, CTF provided funding to the Center for Family Policy and Research at the University of Missouri to revise the Kansas/Missouri Bi-State Core Competencies for Early Care and Education Professionals to include integration of the protective factors. The revised Kansas/Missouri Bi-State Core Competencies are completed and may be accessed at www.openinitiative.org/Content.aspx?file-CoreCompetencies.txt.

Currently, CTF is attempting to measure the effectiveness of the protective factors within families through standardized evaluation as one component of its overall evaluation of the Community Based Child Abuse Prevention (CBCAP) federal grant. A free training resource to support the Strengthening Families<sup>™</sup> Protective Factors Framework in multiple settings is now available online through the National Alliance of Children's Trust and Prevention Funds at www.ctfalliance.org/onlinetraining.htm.

#### **Child Care Aware**

CTF is partnering with Child Care Aware® of Missouri to expand the integration of the Strengthening Families Framework into early childcare and education through a fourteen month project consisting of three related projects. The *Small Steps, Big Footprints* project involved the development and distribution of a two-page mailer containing specific, easy to implement strategies for promoting the protective factors in child care settings as well as resource information. Approximately 9,000 child care facilities in Missouri received the mailer. The Strengthening Families Community College Curriculum project involves the development of a curriculum, based on the Strengthening Families Framework, and can be used through varying depths of content within existing community college courses. There are seventeen two-year community college early child hood programs in Missouri, seven of which are involved in the pilot process. The curriculum is anticipated to be completed by November 2012. The third project involves providing the Zero to Three Prevent Child Abuse and Neglect training to early care and education professionals throughout Missouri. CTF committed \$146,000 to this project.

#### State Technical Assistance Team (STAT)

In Fiscal Year 2012, CTF awarded \$10,705 to the State Technical Assistance Team (STAT), Missouri Department of Social Services (DSS), which provided six (6) regional trainings to 301 child protection professionals on Multidisciplinary Child Abuse and Fatality Training and child event best practices investigations. The funds also supported the Missouri Child Fatality Review Program (CFRP) Annual Report, *Preventing Child Deaths in Missouri*.

#### **Missouri Prevention Partners (MPP)**

MPP is a coalition of statewide public and private organizations with a mission to prevent child abuse and neglect in Missouri. Created in 2006, MPP has adopted a set of beliefs including:

- Every child should be safe, nurtured and supported in their family; every family should be safe, nurtured and supported in their community.
- All systems at all levels should be accountable to the families, children and communities they serve.

The Coalition convenes 3 to 4 times per year and develops goals & outcomes around leadership, public education and outreach, prevention programming, resource development and policy & legislation.

## Statewide Projects / Initiatives continued

#### Home Visitation Prevention Services

With funding provided by the Missouri Department of Social Services (DSS), CTF partnered with Nurses For Newborns Foundation (NFNF) to provide essential home visitation prevention services in St. Louis City and County, Franklin, Jefferson, St. Charles, St. Francois and Washington counties. Additional counties served include Lincoln, Butler, Carter, Iron, Reynolds, Shannon and Wayne. These services, provided by a registered nurse, target parents twenty-one years of age or younger and parents exceeding this age who are mentally and/or physically challenged or who are substance abusers. The project focused on promoting effective parenting skills, prevention of repeat teen pregnancies, increasing educational achievement, increasing self-support and self-esteem, promoting healthy birth outcomes, and ensuring the safety and overall well-being of children. In Fiscal Year 2012, NFNF provided 5,480 service hours through home visits to 1,102 families (2,250 individuals) as a result of this project. Outcomes reported include prevention of subsequent pregnancies among teen moms participating, increased immunizations of infants, reduction in the inappropriate use of emergency rooms, and 99% of participants free of a substantiated report of child abuse.

#### Safe Crib/Safe Sleep Initiative

CTF provided \$25,000 in Fiscal Year 2012 to the Department of Health & Senior Services (DHSS) to support the Safe Cribs for Missouri Program. The program is implemented through the local county health departments and provides safe portable cribs and crib sheets to low income pregnant women and those with newborns. A prenatal home visit or educational session is provided to each family receiving a crib, as well as a follow-up home visit 4 to 6 weeks following the infant's birth. To avoid duplication, the program does not provide cribs to counties in which there are other current safe crib programs funded through CTF, a Safe Kids Coalition or another funding mechanism. In Fiscal Year 2012, CTF funding provided 126 cribs and the accompanying home visits to families in 26 counties.



## **Public Education & Awareness**

### **Activity Plan**

CTF provides awareness of various prevention messages through available literature and a comprehensive public education plan. CTF contracts with Learfield Communications, Inc. and Firehouse Design to develop an annual strategic plan for its advertising/media and public relations/social media campaigns. The related activity plans include a media mix of print, radio, cable television, website, literature design, blogs, news releases, podcasts, transit, pump toppers, Facebook, Twitter and YouTube. CTF's donor campaigns promote general awareness of CTF, the sale of its specialty license plate and the tax check-off program. The prevention campaigns focus on the importance of prevention, Shaken Baby Syndrome (SBS) prevention, safe sleep environments, positive parenting, emotional child abuse and neglect prevention, the dangers of leaving children unattended in or around vehicles, realistic expectations of children and dealing with stress. At no charge to Missouri residents and organizations, CTF offers rack cards, posters and DVDs to its partners, State departments, hospitals and other child serving agencies throughout Missouri for training purposes and as general information to share with parents and caregivers.

### **Refreshed literature in FY12**

In December 2011 and January 2012, CTF finalized the refreshment of the English and Spanish versions of the Not Even for Minute (NEFAM) rack card/poster, Shaken Baby Syndrome (SBS) rack card/poster and the Safe Crib Safe Sleep (SCSS) poster.

#### SBS/Safe Crib DVD

CTF partnered with the Missouri Department of Health & Senior Services (DHSS) to produce the Prevent Shaken Baby Syndrome (SBS)/Safe Sleep for your Baby DVD that was released by CTF in November 2011. In Fiscal Year 2012, approximately 4500 of these DVDs were distributed throughout Missouri



to delivering hospitals, child care providers, DHSS, the Missouri Department of Corrections (DOC), the Missouri Department of Social Services (DSS) and many other child serving agencies. CTF engaged the following organizations and people during the development of the DVD: Karen Shenk, DHSS; Maureen Hill and Rodney Jones, State Technical Assistance Team (STAT); Doug Beal, M.D.; Robert Harris, M.D.; Lori Behrens, SIDS Resources, Inc.; Mary Case, M.D., Professor of Pathology and Chief Medical Examiner of St. Louis County; and Suzanne McCune, Forensic Administrator of the St. Louis County Medical Examiner's Office. Learfield Communications, Inc.; the Missouri School Board Association (MSBA); Alejandra Gudino from the University of Missouri Extension and Firehouse Design were instrumental in the production of the DVD.

#### **Emotional Well-Being/Abuse Flier**

In December 2011, CTF created and made available the *Emotional Well Being/Emotional Abuse & Neglect Prevention* flier with the assistance of CTF Board member Regina Staves, Ph.D., Assistant Professor, Psychology at Avila University, who shared her expertise throughout the development of this piece.



In February 2012, CTF debuted Prevention \$ense, a bi-weekly e-newsletter provided to CTF Board members, grantees, key contacts and other prevention partners.

#### Missouri State Employees Charitable Campaign

CTF received \$3,928.47 in Calendar Year 2011 from the Missouri State Employees Charitable Campaign (MSECC). CTF exhibited during the MSECC kick-off in the Truman Building September 2011 and participated in other individual State department related events.

#### Check-Off Child Abuse in Missouri



For Missourians who receive a refund

on their Missouri State Income Tax Returns, the Tax Check-Off Campaign offers a way to designate all or a portion of their refund to CTF. This program was promoted in February and March 2012 using print ads and a radio campaign that aired on the Missouri Net and in the metro areas of St. Louis, Columbia, Kansas City and Springfield. CTF also promotes the campaign via social media, including an electronic flier provided to its Board, prevention partners and professional contacts for further distribution. CTF received \$83,594.42 in Fiscal Year 2012 related to this campaign.

The CTF website serves as a hub for all public information related to CTF and its grant process and is the foundation of the public relations/social media campaign. Through Collectors Solutions,

Inc., the website also offers a secure site to accept online general and license plate donations (credit/debit card/e-checking).

## **Award Presentations**

#### **Easter Award**

Detective Trenny Wilson of the St. Joseph Police Department received the 2012 Richard P. Easter Award for her exemplary contribution to child abuse and neglect prevention and child protection efforts. Detective Sergeant Jennifer Protzman of the Department was the nominator, and the recommendation was supported by the State Technical Assistance Team (STAT). Det. Wilson received the award during a surprise ceremony before her family and peers in St. Joseph June 28, 2012 at the Department. The CTF Board of Directors established this award in honor of the late Richard P. Easter, who was long associated with the law enforcement and criminal justice fields and is remembered for his commitment and leadership in promoting statewide prevention efforts to better protect Missouri's children.

#### **Chair Award**

Mary Case, M.D., Professor of Pathology and Chief Medical Examiner of St. Louis County, and Suzanne McCune, Forensic Administrator of the St. Louis County Medical Examiner's Office, each received the 2011 CTF Chair Award for their outstanding and steadfast support of CTF. In particular, the two were recognized for sharing their very valuable time and expertise to develop the Prevent Shaken Baby Syndrome (SBS)/ Safe Sleep for your Baby DVD that was released by CTF in November 2011. The Chair Award is given by the CTF Board Chair at his or her discretion to recognize a Board member, former Board member, other individual or organization for exemplary service and/or volunteer work on behalf of CTF.



## **Prevention Programmin**

Fiscal Year 2012 (July 1, 2011 – June 30, 2012)

#### **General Prevention Grants**

The CTF Board of Directors approved and awarded \$1,097,304 for Fiscal Year 2012 to fifty-seven (57) community-based organizations and agencies throughout Missouri to provide programs and services that help support families reduce the risk of child abuse and neglect. CTF funded specific child abuse and neglect models that included safe sleep, infant nurturing, father support, grandparent support, home visitation, parent support and education, mentoring, respite care, research and training.

To promote sustainability, CTF commits funding to successful grantees on a five-year cycle. CTF funds projects at 100% during years one and two; in year three, CTF funds 75%, and the grantee provides a 25% local match; in year four, CTF funds 50%, and the local match is 50%; and in year five, CTF funds 25%, and the local match is 75%.

#### **Discretionary Grants**

CTF allocates a certain portion of its annual program budget to fund discretionary projects or 'mini-grants.' Discretionary funding is designed to be responsive to low-cost prevention projects or needs identified by individual communities, organizations or agencies. A maximum of \$5,000 per grant award is available for these special prevention projects. During Fiscal Year 2012, CTF awarded \$54,155 in discretionary funding to thirteen (13) grantees.

#### **Community Based Child Abuse Prevention** (CBCAP) Grants

In Fiscal Year 2012, CTF awarded \$548,000 to four (4) Missouri communities to continue their Community Based Child Abuse Prevention (CBCAP) grant projects. The four CBCAP sites are Pemiscot County Initiative Network (Dunklin and Pemiscot Counties), The Alliance of Southwest Missouri (Jasper and Newton Counties), Barceda Families (Polk, Hickory and Dallas Counties) and the Jefferson County Community Partnership (Jefferson County).

CBCAP funding is a federal initiative administered by the Administration of Children, Youth and Families (ACF), Department of Health and Human Services. CTF is the designated lead agency to administer this funding in Missouri. By incorporating a lead agency concept, the CBCAP communities provide a seamless coordination and delivery of prevention and family support services to families and children; reduce duplication of existing services; maximize resources of public and private providers; and ultimately reduce the risk of child abuse and neglect. During Fiscal Year 2012, 252 high risk families consisting of 812 individuals received services through this project.

The Missouri CBCAP model is recognized by ACF as attaining the highest level of program standards and performance indicated by evidenced-based outcomes and successful replication of the program in other communities. CBCAP sites continue to show statistically

> significant improvement in scores of standardized measures of family risk (Child Abuse Potential Inventory) and distress (Parent Stress Index) among participating parents. Families also report high levels of satisfaction with the services they receive, and providers report a high level of satisfaction with this community collaboration model. An additional outcome includes communities successfully leveraging other funds, thereby increasing their capacity to better serve families. CTF continues to strengthen the evaluation component of this model by measuring the effectiveness of the protective factors within families. Additionally, CTF issued a social cost savings report in FY 2012 outlining both short and long-term direct and indirect costs of child maltreatment and the impact/savings that the CBCAP model provides.
