Message from the Director

Dear Partners and Friends,

Our world, this year, has revolved around COVID-19. At CTF, we have felt torn between our desire to stay on the path that we have so carefully planned out for our mission and the need to modify our path because our environment has changed.

In 2020, CTF made an investment in capacity building for child abuse prevention agencies in Missouri. Although we typically fund interventions that work directly to prevent child abuse, we recognize that these interventions will never create impact if the non-profits that deliver them are not strong. We funded organizations to create strategic plans, increase fundraising capacity and build collective impact structures. Over the next few years, we hope to see these agencies grow stronger and stronger.

We also released emergency funding to CTF grantees to assist non-profits in serving emerging needs related to COVID-19, adapting services and maintaining financial stability.

In the coming years, CTF will continue to implement our strategic plan and become more targeted in the interventions we fund (home visiting, sexual abuse prevention, child fatality prevention), but we will also always strive to build, strengthen and value our partners who make this work possible. We are deeply grateful to all the organizations in Missouri who share our mission to prevent child abuse. Thank you.

Capacity Building Grants Improve Effectiveness in CAN Prevention Fiscal Year 2020 (July 1, 2019 - June 30, 2020):

In Fiscal Year 2020 CTF awarded **\$193,347.41** through its Capacity Building Grant Program. The funding supported six organizations undertaking internally-focused efforts designed to help them fulfill their mission and improve their effectiveness in reducing child maltreatment. Areas of focus include strategic planning, resource development and Collective Impact.

Working together to reach a *shared goal*.

Two of the Capacity Building grantees – Boone County Community Services Department and the Community Partnership of the Ozarks (Greene County) – are implementing Collective Impact approaches to home visiting.



This plan allows us to be innovative and creative within the context of our mission, ultimately allowing us to serve more families better utilizing our resources and bringing together the entire network of those who help keep children safe and healthy.

HOPE for Child Maltreatment Prevention in Missouri:

Using the Science of the Positive to Identify & Increase Protective Cultural Norms

The Children's Trust Fund (CTF) hosted a Positive Community Norms (PCN) Training Institute November 6-7, 2019 at the Millbottom in Jefferson City for over sixty attendees.

The Montana Institute (TMI) National Team presenters included Dr. Jeff Linkenbach, Dr. Bob Sege and Jennifer Jones who explored how to apply PCN to improve child well-being, increase positive parenting practices and prevent child maltreatment in our state.

Topics

- New research on Health Outcomes from Positive Experiences (HOPE), a powerful complement to Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACES)-based work that presents new opportunities for promoting resiliency and health in children.
- How the Science of the Positive can be used to identify the strengths and protective factors that already exist in our communities, and amplify them to create meaningful social change.

The event kicked off a multi-year data collection and communication project designed to promote healthy and protective cultural norms. In 2021, CTF will begin developing campaigns to target PCN in Missouri.


Program Disbursement Prevention Grants Fiscal Year 2020

CTF seeks to move the needle for children at risk of abuse. To do this, we must move past hoping to do good things and move towards showing that we have done good things. We are emphasizing program types with proven track records of preventing abuse and using data to demonstrate outcomes. Then, we want to use the data that demonstrates good outcomes to capture the downstream financial benefit of preventing abuse. This is an opportunity for fiscal sustainability for the programs we fund.

Moving the needle for children at risk of abuse is a heavy lift and will take time. If it were easy, everyone would already be doing it. However, just because it is hard and brings change doesn't mean we should shy away. Our children deserve the uncompromising best, and CTF will lead in that direction.



In late Fiscal Year 2020, COVID-19 made delivering prevention services to families more difficult at a time when the risk for child maltreatment was increasing.


Missouri Children's Trust Fund Awards COVID-19 Relief Funding to Boost Community Prevention Efforts

To meet critical needs, the CTF Board of Directors took immediate action to award \$155,442 in COVID-19 Relief Funding to fifteen (15) of its FY2020 child abuse prevention grantees.

In addition to the added relief funding, CTF allowed grantees to:

- Bill for services that could reasonably shift from being in-person to virtual or via telephone, including virtual home visits or online parent classes
- Amend approved budgets to shift funding to meet current need
- Carry over unspent funds into Fiscal Year 2021

"CTF appreciates the communities who serve our most vulnerable children and is pleased to offer this funding," said Amy Beecher-McCarthy, CTF Board Chair. "I hope others will reach out and support organizations in their own communities that are working to strengthen families and protect children."

Public Education

CTF partnered with, sponsored and/or created the following three public education campaigns to enhance overall statewide reach:

- 1. CTF Seek Help Prevention Campaign Focus: normalize parental stress and encourage the social norm that it is ok for parents to ask for help
- 2. Missouri KidsFirst #Essential4Kids Campaign Focus: promote the MKF #Essential4Kids campaign encouraging people to be mindful of children's well-being during COVID-19 and to call the Missouri Child Abuse/Neglect Hotline as necessary
- 3. ParentLink WarmLine Campaign Focus: promote the ParentLink WarmLine to people needing parenting advice/information especially during stressful times



Did you know...

CTF receives \$15 for each marriage license issued in the State of Missouri by the county Recorder of Deeds and \$7 for each certified copy issued.

CTF receives \$5 for each vital record issued by the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services.

In 1983 CTF became the very first tax checkoff program appearing on the Missouri State Tax Form.

In 1997 the state legislature approved the CTF Prevent Child Abuse License Plate, becoming only the second child abuse prevention license plate to be implemented in the country.



Strategic Initiatives

In addition to funds awarded, CTF will embark on several new efforts in FY 2021 including:

Prioritized Programming

- Support home visiting collective impact sites in Kansas City, Columbia, St. Louis and Springfield
- Release funding for safe sleep efforts

Strengthened Grant Making

- Create a home visiting pay for success rate card
- Develop evaluations for sexual abuse prevention and safe sleep funds
- Educate stakeholders on priority focus areas

Targeted Public Information

 Begin developing social norms campaigns

Policy Advocacy for Systems Change

- Expand access to and quality of home visiting in Missouri
- Educate key decision makers on importance of sexual abuse prevention
- Work to integrate value-based payment systems into other state funding streams
- Create a policy agenda on early child governance and child care in partnership with Zero to Three team
